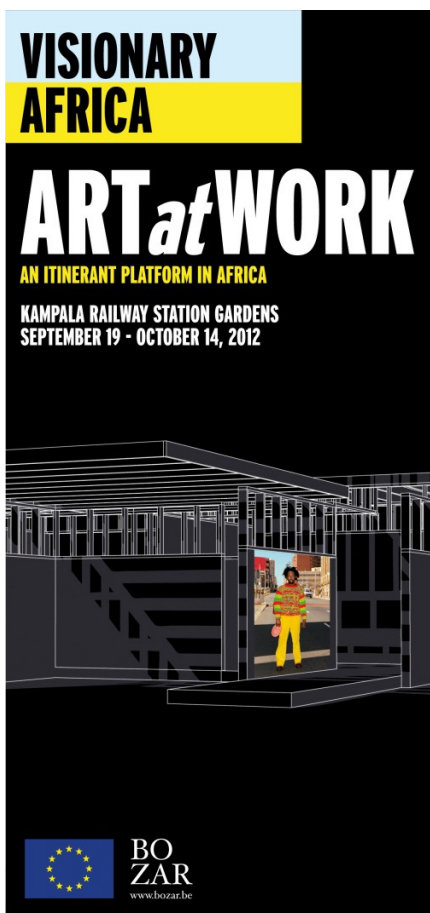

Introduction

As Uganda gears itself for significant future growth in the next decade, the city of Kampala assesses the ensuing economic, social and cultural changes within the city. **To discuss the challenges and choices Kampala and East African Capitals face, an unprecedented inclusive debate is organized among city stakeholders of the region together with international experts, on the city's urban development and the role of art and architecture in it.**

The morning session will address the *role and responsibilities of authorities, urban planners, architects, and arts managers in the development of a strategic vision for their city and in the planning process; and action and tools at their disposal to guarantee a sustainable and inclusive development of African cities.*

The afternoon session will address *initiatives needed so that authorities, urban planners, architects and arts managers can have a decisive role in the sustainable and inclusive development of their city.*



Objectives

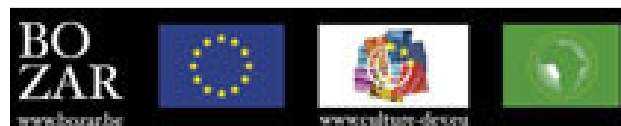
The overall objective of the conference is twofold:

- a **Declaration of Kampala**, setting a framework for the role of art and architecture in the development of East Africa's capitals including **Recommendations** for Kampala and the other capitals of the region.
- a proposal for a permanent **mechanism towards inclusive and sustainable urban development among capital cities** in the East African region.

Each speaker will be asked to close his/her presentation with a statement towards these objectives.

This conference is part of the "Visionary Africa - Art at Work" initiative launched by the European Commission and the African Union in the framework of the celebrations of the 50th anniversary of the independence of numerous African countries. The initiative, developed by the Centre for Fine Arts in Brussels (BOZAR), proposes a travelling platform that explores the link between art, culture and public spaces in African capitals. It was already presented in Ouagadougou, Addis Ababa, Cairo, Harare, Bujumbura, and is now hosted in Kampala September 18-October 14, 2012. http://www.bozar.be/activity_world.php?id=12592

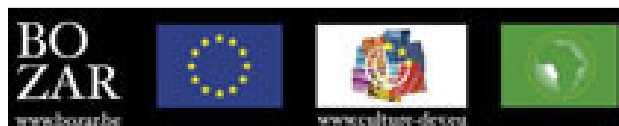

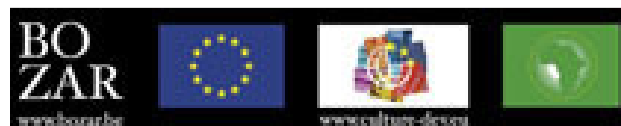

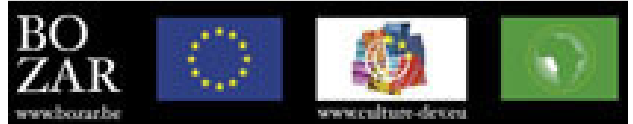
