Action in humanitarian protection


Action towards the duty-bearer stakeholders:

- *Substitution*
- *Support*
- *Persuasion/Mobilization*
- *Denunciation*


Protection activities, according to objectives and term

- **Responsive activities**
 - Stop, prevent, alleviate the worst effects of violations and patterns of abuse.
 - Immediate and urgent, targeting specific groups/persons.
- **Remedial activities**
 - Restore dignity in the aftermath of violations.
 - Support people living with the effects of violations.
 - Can be preventive of secondary abuse.
- **Environment-Building activities**
 - Create an environment that allows full respect of rights.
 - Deep change in attitudes, policies, values, beliefs.
 - Prevention and long-term transformation of causes.

Strategic mapping of protection responses




An acute protection crisis starts

Protracted crisis with no adequate response by duty-bearer stakeholders



Complementarity in protection (ICRC)

- *A concerted effort*
- *Their different mandates, expertise, resources and networks*
- *Identified protection needs and desired outcomes for threatened populations*
- ***Diversity and cooperation***
- *Joint effort versus single agency work (CLUSTER)*
- *Efficiency*
