


Children are central to development

- Children make up one-third of the global population (2010: 2.2 billion children)
- By 2025: another 2.5 billion children will be born
- 1 in 3 urban dwellers lives in slum conditions; (in Africa, 6 in 10)
- 13 children under the age 5 die of preventable causes every minute
- 22.6 million infants in the developing world are not immunized before their first birthday
- more than one third of child deaths are attributable to undernutrition

A strategic collaboration to support the realization of child rights

Since 2008, the European Union (EU) and its member States have been committed to applying a comprehensive and integrated human rights-based approach in all areas of EU external action, including EU development cooperation. This commitment is in line with the Convention on the Rights of the Child(CRC), which has been ratified by virtually every country in the world, and reinforces the 15-year on-going partnership between the European Commission and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) aimed at fulfilling the rights of the most vulnerable children in fundamental areas such as nutrition, health, education and access to water and sanitation.

As part of their strategic collaboration, UNICEF and the EU have developed a 'Child Rights Toolkit: Integrating child rights in development cooperation' to strengthen the capacity of development partners, European Commission staff, bilateral donors and other development actors to integrate a child rights approach throughout development programming, budgeting, policy-making and law making. The toolkit looks beyond traditional child-focused sectors and programmes (such as education and maternal health) to demonstrate how development cooperation can effectively contribute to the fulfillment of children's rights.
