

CONCEPT NOTE – FOREST GOVERNANCE FORUM, YAOUNDÉ

This concept note outlines the aims and objectives, draft agenda and thoughts on working groups for the Forest Governance Forum (FGF), which will be held between 22nd and 24th October 2014 in Yaoundé, Cameroon.

This event will be the ninth conference implemented under the auspices of the '[Strengthening African Forest Governance](#)' project, financed by the European Union and DFID and led by the University of Wolverhampton. The project operates in Cameroon, DRC, Ghana and Liberia.

The objective of FGF is to provide a free and open space for the exchange of information, ideas and research around Forest Governance and FLEGT. FGF aims to contribute to the wider aims of the SAFG project through raising awareness and the profile of FLEGT, and through engaging private sector, communities and governmental stakeholders. FGF is organised by [theIDLgroup](#), in partnership with local organisations. In Cameroon, the local partner is FODER. Information on previous events is available [here](#).

Approximately 150 participants will be invited by the organisers and their partners and will be drawn from government, civil society, the private sector, forest-dependent communities, international organisations, the academic community, the media and donor organisations.

The regional event will aim to work with partners and other projects to bring international delegations to participate in the conference and to share experiences, thus enriching the global FLEGT process.

Themes for the event will be experience-sharing and documenting lessons learned from the FLEGT process, and, as this is the final event, what developments lie ahead for the future.

The outcome of the event will be a conference report which captures the results of the Q&A at session level and the findings from the working groups, with recommendations.

The first day will comprise of three 1.5 hour sessions, with three presentations in each session followed by 45 minutes of open audience Q&A. The second day will comprise of two further sessions, and a working group in the afternoon.

The third day will comprise of working groups and reporting to the plenary session.
