

The Ribble Basin

- 2118km²
- •1.25 Million population
- •90% Rural
- Northwest England





Objectives

- Report on the performance of European Guidance
- Help the Environment Agency refine national guidance on methods, tools and procedures
- Help the business assess the implications on resources (money & skills)
- Help stakeholders understand what it means
- Prepare the basin for implementation



Directive requirements for public participation

- 1. Member states shall encourage active involvement of all interested parties
- 2. Member states shall ensure they publish and make available:
 - a timetable and work programme
 - an interim overview of significant issues
 - draft copies of the River Basin Management Plan
- 3. Access shall be given to background information


Participation Assumptions

Who are the interested parties?

- all those organisations who have powers and procedures which can deliver elements of the Programme of Measures (stakeholder/regulators)
- all those individuals and organisations who use the water environment and whose activities impact on the water environment (stakeholder/deliverers)
- the general public



Participation Methods Tested



Yellow - Informing, listening & active involvement Green - Listening & learning Blue - Information provision



Choice of technique depends on:

- stage of the process
- objectives
- -stakeholders
- resources
- -scale



Link process to product

- issue based participation
- meaningful participation
- Integrated planning needs public participation



Don't try and engage with general public - 86% aren't interested!

- Focus on issues
- Internet can be used for those 14% interested
- Use local organisations (e.g. environmental groups)
- Concerted engagement works



A stakeholder vision is powerful

- Aspirational thinking drives actions
- Active involvement with interested parties
- Shared Learning builds consensus
- Manages expectations



- Be Flexible and use a 'Toolkit' approach
- Scale is crucial basin scale works
- Use current best practice
- Don't lose focus on the problem!
