Conclusions of the second Political Working Group

1. Introduction

The European Union (EU) and the Cooperative Republic of Guyana (Guyana), hereinafter ‘the Partners’, concluded in November 2022 a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for a **Forest Partnership**. The Forest Partnership reflects their **shared vision** for a holistic and integrated approach to forests implemented on the basis of **formal strategic dialogue and policy cooperation bilaterally and in the international arena**. In this context, the Partners launch a partnership, hereinafter “Forest Partnership”, in the area of protection, restoration and sustainable management and use of forests aimed at:

- i) ENHANCING the role of Guyana’s forests in sustainable and inclusive national development, and
- ii) ADDRESSING challenges related to deforestation, forest degradation, climate change and loss of biodiversity

In the first year following the signature of the MoU, the Partners developed quantified **targets** and a **Roadmap** for implementation, as well as formalised the Technical and Political **Working Groups**.

In order to further support the implementation of the roadmap, the Partners agreed to the development of a **work plan** for the year 2024.

2. Progress towards the targets

The **targets** to help sustain momentum and steer action towards the achievement of the objectives set in the MoU, to be reached by **2030**, are:

- (1) Increase the area of protected, restored or sustainably managed forests:
 - Maintain Sustainably managed forests: 12.5 million ha
 - Expand Protected & Conserved forests: 30% by 2030 of terrestrial and marine spaces
 - Increase Restored forests: 200,000 ha
- (2) Increase the number of forest-related decent jobs by at least 8%
- (3) Maintain the annual rate of deforestation of natural forests: hal/y deforestation below 0.1%

The progress towards the Forest Partnership targets will be updated on a yearly basis in the **Annual report implementing the Guyana Forest Partnership with the European Union**.

For 2024, the following progress has been made:

3. The Roadmap and work plan

The **Roadmap** constitutes the operational framework for implementing the Forest Partnership and achieving the targets laid out in the Agreement. It was developed using a consultative and participatory approach with the Technical Working Group (TWG) members and endorsed by the Partners at the first Political Working Group (PWG) on 29 June 2023.

Since its endorsement, the Partners, through the TWG, have developed a **work plan** for implementing several Roadmap actions in 2024. These actions span milestones across the four (4) different Work Streams in the Roadmap and address critical issues linked to the achievement of the Forest Partnership targets. Sustainable **investments in the forestry sector** towards achieving the objectives are also being pursued.

4. Working Groups

Since the signature of the MoU, four (4) TWG meetings were convened:

- 1st TWG, 6 March, 2023
- 2nd TWG, 6 December, 2023
- 3rd TWG, 29 January, 2024
- 4th TWG, 5 June, 2024

In addition, a forest coordination meeting was organized in March 2024 by the EU Delegation in Georgetown, Guyana, in which multiple significant factors of the Forest Partnership were discussed regarding support in the forest sector in Guyana.

The first PWG was co-chaired in Brussels on 29 June, 2023 by the Hon. Minister of Natural Resources of Guyana, Vickram Bharrat, and the European Commissioner for International Partnerships, Jutta Urpilainen.

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The second PWG is co-chaired in Georgetown on 7 June 2024, by the Hon. Minister of Natural Resources of Guyana, Vickram Bharrat, and the Ambassador of the European Union to Guyana, René van Nes.

5. Conclusions

The Partners have agreed to the following:

1. The Partners approved the Forest Partnership **Work Plan for 2024**
2. The Partners agreed to **review and update the Roadmap and the composition of the TWG** by the end of 2024
3. The Partners agreed to **update the targets** once per year in the Forest Partnership **Annual Report**
