





The majority of respondents (67%) come from civil society organisations. Respondents participate in partnerships at several and multiple levels, but most MSPs in the survey are local, followed by closely by regional level. The majority of MSPs are longstanding, more than 3 years in existence, and more than 95% of them advance the 2030 Agenda. 79% of respondents find participation in the MSP very useful for their organisation and 21% find participation somewhat useful. 82% of all respondents expect their MSP to remain relevant.

Levels of partnership




Does your MSP work to advance the Sustainable Development Goals?






Respondents said their MSP is useful for fostering dialogue on issues of common interest, whereas only 27 said their MSP is useful for promoting a common front.



As for challenges faced, the most common is lack of resources to sustain collective efforts, followed by inadequate capacity.



The main impact of the MSPs seen thus far is increased dialogue and coordination, followed by increased involvement in projects.
